What is a manifesto?

- A manifesto is a statement of beliefs, aims or policies
- Manifestos can be used for many different purposes, such as: political party manifestos, brand declarations, or personal statements







Election Manifestos

- In local + national elections, candidates will create + run on manifestos.
- These usually involve promises or commitments for things they want to do if elected.
- In these, they will try to secure voters by appealing to what they care about + value.







Writing a Manifesto

- Writing a successful manifesto is all about selling yourself
- You want to put your best foot forward + show everyone why you're best for a job or why your voice is important
- It's a **statement for success** and a **declaration** of what you intend to do!





Your Candidate Manifesto



- As a candidate in the Student Officer Elections, you will need to submit a 300-word written manifesto.
- This is a strict word limit. Any words over that limit will be cut off.
- Your manifesto appears on the ballot paper for students to read when casting their vote.
- You have a chance to make edits to your manifesto until
 10am on Tuesday 4th March



Mini Manifesto

- In addition to your main manifesto, we also need a mini manifesto from you!
- You should include a short summary of your key messages, which will be used in our Candidate Booklet
- Your full manifesto will still be available to voters on our website
- The limit for this is **50 words**
- The deadline to submit this is: 10am on Tuesday 4th March
- Submission is optional





Manifesto Top Tips

- Be clear + straightforward
 - Use language which is understandable to all voters + is clear on what your goals are
- Use engaging language
 - Know your audience this isn't a standard job application, so don't just list your previous experience
 - Try and use engaging language to help capture voters' attention + make them remember you



Manifesto Top Tips

Keep on topic

- It's great to demonstrate your experience, but you've only got 300 words to get your message across so make sure to keep on topic.
- Don't waffle!

Don't be afraid to stand out

- Don't be afraid to go against the grain with what you care about, instead of just promising the same thing as everyone else it might strongly resonate with students!
- Let your personality shine through!





Manifesto Top Tips

- Be true to yourself
 - Write about what you actually care about, not just what you think people want to hear
 - Make sure it's something you're actually passionate about changing
- Be specific + realistic with your promises
 - If elected, you're committed to working on your manifesto points make sure they're actually achievable
 - Don't overpromise focus on 3 or 4 key issues





Have a Think About...

- What voters do you want to appeal to?
 - There are issues that are **universal** to all students but there will also be things that are specific to different groups, based on identity, course, type of study etc.
 - Try + decide what groups you want to target
- What makes you stand out?
 - Think about your unique voice + perspective and how you could use this to appeal to voters
 - What skills or qualities do you have that others might not?





Al & Manifestos

- Some people may find Generative AI to be a useful tool when shaping the structure of a manifesto
- If you're using AI to help you, make sure you're not relying on this to write your entire manifesto
- Remember manifestos that are personal + unique are the most popular with voters – you won't get this with AI!
- Focus back on our Top Tips: be true to yourself, stand out + be specific





Manifesto Writing Prompts



- What are your values?
- What are the things that you're passionate about?
- Think about what you as a student would have wanted someone to put in place for you.
- What problems do students face + how could we solve them?







Election Manifesto Examples



The Good

- Good balance of text
- + 4 clear commitments with some info on how to achieve that
- + Info on their experience
- Could have more personal info qualities, skills, values etc.

Making ECs Easier:

- Regular EC drop-in sessions.
- Clearer signposting on the process of ECs, e.g. how they work and what counts as evidence.

SUPPORT RELATED EVENTS ON CAMPUS:

- More support related events on campus, e.g. dog therapy & mindfulness throughout the year.
- Creation of the "WellFair" in which all university support services are available for drop-in sessions, making themselves accessible to students. This will occur twice a year.

International Student Support:

- Create an International Buddy Scheme to bridge the gap between international and home students.
- Introducing an International Student Survey with the aim of identifying how the university can support international students.

SEXUAL HEALTH AND WELLBEING:

- Free STI kits, sanitary products, condoms and pregnancy tests available on all campuses in discrete and accessible locations.
- Bring back sexual health nurses on campus, with frequent appointment dates.

- Not just generic commitments – feels like issues they're actually passionate about
- + 4 clear commitments
- + Info on their experience
- + Feel personality shining through more

- Strict 300-word limit
- Your mini manifesto: 50-word limit
